Dear Chancellor Matos Rodríguez,

I am writing to insist again that all adjuncts receive their first Fall semester paycheck on time. Late adjunct paychecks are a perennial problem at CUNY. The University could not function without the work of thousands of teaching and non-teaching adjuncts. They teach the majority of classes at CUNY, yet their positions are insecure and they earn far less than their full-time colleagues. When it came to our negotiated ratification bonuses, adjuncts had to wait more than two months longer than their fulltime colleagues. Delays to adjunct pay are unjust.

On-time pay should be a given at a 21st century university. But at the start of nearly every semester, the union hears from adjuncts facing the financial stress and disrespect of late paychecks. It's a systemic problem that your administration has, to date, failed to remedy. We've tracked hundreds of affected adjuncts in the last few years. Your administration's practice of centralizing hiring practices and hiring conditions while delegating responsibility to the colleges when payroll problems arise is unacceptable.

I send a similar letter each year, but the problems have persisted. You have the power and obligation to address these problems: the university can fix technical issues, coordinate with college payroll offices and deans to treat adjunct pay as a priority, and improve hiring practices. And you can fight for the funding for full-time positions so the colleges are not reliant on a contingent workforce, last-minute hiring, and a lack of administrative support for departments. It is unacceptable to hold department chairs responsible for late adjunct pay when your administration establishes the conditions in which they work.

If paychecks do arrive late, we insist that college Human Resources offices offer guidance to affected adjuncts about obtaining a salary advance and provide them a letter, as needed, to give to their landlords or other creditors.

The expectation that adjuncts simply wait to be compensated is unacceptable.
