Oppose Military Aggression Against Venezuela

- 2 Whereas, U.S. political and military aggression toward Venezuela and the wider
- 3 Caribbean is escalating—including the deployment of more than 10,000 U.S. military
- 4 personnel, ongoing naval operations, and actions that have resulted in the killing of
- 5 over 80 people on boats off the Venezuelan coast—based on unproven claims of
- 6 drug smuggling from the U.S. mainland and creating conditions many observers
- 7 describe as a march toward a new war in the Americas;
- 8 Whereas, the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, Volker Türk,
- 9 has formally condemned the military strikes conducted by the U.S. administration
- 10 against vessels in the Caribbean Sea and eastern Pacific Ocean; and has called for
- a full and independent investigation into these acts which represent a clear violation
- of international human rights law and the principles of the United Nations Charter;
- 13 Whereas, the demonization of Venezuela and other Latin American countries in
- 14 mainstream U.S. media inflames xenophobic and racist narratives long used to
- iustify intervention in the hemisphere, and such narratives directly impact CUNY's
- students and workers, many of whom are immigrants from Latin America and the
- 17 Caribbean:

- Whereas, since the 19th century the Monroe Doctrine has served as a justification
- 19 for repeated U.S. political, military, and economic interventions across Latin America
- and the Caribbean, undermining governments, social movements, and trade unions
- 21 committed to working-class struggles, resulting in repression, military coups,
- 22 sanctions, and widespread killings of civilians, workers, and their organizations;
- 23 Whereas, U.S. militarization in the Caribbean—carried out even as federal aid is
- 24 slashed, benefits are cut, Affordable Care Act premiums are set to rise, and public
- 25 resources are clawed back from New York City—diverts desperately needed funds
- 26 from education, healthcare, housing, infrastructure and other social needs at a time
- when CUNY remains chronically underfunded;
- 28 Whereas, Venezuelan workers, students, and communities—like workers
- 29 everywhere—deserve peace and the right to determine their own political, economic.
- and social future free from foreign intervention;
- 31 Whereas, the PSC, in solidarity with international workers harmed by U.S. wars and
- 32 military occupations, has consistently declared its resolute support for anti-war
- campaigns, has successfully organized events like the 2019 "Should an Anti-War
- 34 Union Oppose Sanctions?" and has brought anti-war resolutions forward for adoption
- 35 by NYSUT, and the AFT in the past,

- 36 Be it resolved, that the PSC opposes any U.S. military intervention, coercive action,
- or aggression against Venezuela and any regional expansion of the conflict,
- 38 Be it further resolved, that the PSC will bring this resolution forward for consideration
- 39 by our state affiliate NYSUT, and our national affiliate the AFT, in order to help build
- 40 a broad labor movement that opposes U.S. intervention in Venezuela and supports
- 41 sovereignty, peace, and international law in the Americas.
